

Using Berean Builders Science with *Tapestry of Grace*

There is no perfect way to synchronize Berean Builders science with a history course, because of the way science progressed. Nevertheless, if you are trying to make your study of science consistent with *Tapestry of Grace*, here is how the timeline in Berean Builders science compares to what is found in there.

Year 1

Unit 1: All of *Science in the Beginning* (which covers only creation)
Units 2-4: Lessons 1-45 in *Science in the Ancient World*

Year 2

Unit 1: Lessons 46-67 of *Science in the Ancient World*
Unit 2: Lessons 68-90 of *Science in the Ancient World*
Lessons 1-31 of *Science in the Scientific Revolution*
Unit 3: Lessons 32-90 of *Science in the Scientific Revolution*
Lessons 1-18 of *Science in the Age of Reason*
Unit 4: Lessons 19-70 of *Science in the Age of Reason*

Year 3

Unit 1: Lessons 71-90 of *Science in the Age of Reason*
Lessons 1-21 of *Science in the Industrial Age*
Unit 2: Lessons 22-30 of *Science in the Industrial Age*
Unit 3: Lessons 31-65 of *Science in the Industrial Age*
Unit 4: Lessons 66-90 of *Science in the Industrial Age*

Year 4

This time period is not covered in Berean Builders Science.

I would not recommend actually covering science so that it synchronizes with *Tapestry of Grace*, because too much is covered in the early years and not enough is covered in the later years. However, if you start *Science in the Beginning* with year 1 of *Tapestry of Grace* and then just cover one book each year, your science will always be behind your history. As a result, you will be reviewing the history you learned previously as you study science.

If you would like to complete the entire science series within the four-year span of *Tapestry of Grace*, you will need to cover 113 lessons in Berean Builders science each year. That's a full book plus 23 lessons of the next book. While this sounds like a lot, remember that you can skip the "challenge lessons," of which there are 18 per year. If you skip the "challenge" lessons, then, you will be covering only a bit more than 90 lessons per year.
